


Metro and Nonmetro Counties - 2013












Percent Distribution of the American Indian and Alaska Native Population by American Indian/Alaska Native Area of Residence: 2010





Low education counties, 2015




Low education counties are those where 20 percent or more of county residents age 25-64 did not have a high school diploma or equivalent, determined by the American Community Survey 5-year average data for 2008-12.

Low employment counties, 2015




Low employment counties are those where less than 65 percent of county residents age 25-64 were employed, determined by the American Community Survey 5-year average data for 2008-12.

Persistent poverty counties, 2015



Persistent poverty counties are those where 20 percent or more of county residents were poor, measured by the 1980, 1990, 2000 censuses, and the 2007-11 American Community Survey.
